




YEAR 7 CHALLENGE READS


Wonder by R.J. Palacio

After being home-schooled for years, Auggie Pullman is about to start fifth grade, but he's worried: How will he fit into middle-school life when he looks so different from everyone else?




The Secret Garden by Frances Hodgson Burnett


Peter Pan by J.M. Barrie


A Kind of Spark by Elle McNicoll


Kit's Wilderness by David Almond


Noughts and Crosses by Malorie Blackman


Wed Wabbit by Lissa Evans


The Sword in the Stone by T.H.White


The Bone Sparrow by Zana Fraillon


Fire Colour One by Jenny Valentine


Rebound by Kwame Alexander
